

Saturday morning dawned bright and sunny. Well it was at 10,000 ft, way above the thick grey thick cloud base but sadly not below it where we were. Laura wisely postponed the start of our drive by 30 mins for the weather to improve. I did consider going back to bed but was given a look by Mrs. P that suggested it may not be a wise move! Sure enough the rain stopped and we didn't see another drop all day! Before the briefing by Laura – or it may have been after – lack of sleep does that to me – we assembled for the group photo.



At the morning briefing each car was given a series of sealed envelopes containing the details of the events of the day. Actually, the navigators were handed the envelopes as the cars were German and the contents being written in English might put the cars at an unfair linguistic disadvantage. Proceeds from donations, sale of items, a 50/50, and from the sale of food and beverages were to aid victims of domestic abuse. Our Porsches lined up in the road outside as the buildings and grounds were already packed with vehicles from many eras and marques. There were also some excellent restorations as well as fine examples of lovingly cared for Ferraris, a fine replica Ford GT40, Vipers, Corvettes, MGs, Healy Sprites, Hudsons, a couple of Porsches (plus our dozen unofficial ones) and on and on. My favorite though was a battered, rusty, mouse infested and long forgotten" International" truck, not part of the show, but languishing way back on the property in a field.

I also spoke for ages with a charming and very enthusiastic Hudson owner who had fully restored his car over many years. He had photos of the car as he bought it – it was not in much better condition than that International truck!

It was certainly a well-attended and extremely well-organized show and we learned later that the proceeds raised for the charity achieved their goal of some \$20,000. Wow, it just shows that car enthusiasts really are generous folks.

And we were still not done for the day! The next envelope revealed wine tasting and seeing some Alpacas! We followed Jamie who had previously dropped off Laura at the location presumably to prepare and calm the animals for the arrival of twelve Porsches and their raucous exhaust notes! We sampled a wide range of very worthy wines from Argentina along with some cheese and chocolate to complement the respective wine varieties. Some folks, it sadly has to be said, sampled far more wine than others, but what happens at an Alpaca farm stays at an Alpaca farm. Then we learned a lot about Alpacas from Laura. For those who aren't at all knowledgeable about these fine creatures and think of them as very similar to Llamas, it is easy to tell the difference.

Llamas have long banana shaped ears and are typically much bigger. I knew that of course but was glad that Laura pointed it out for others. There were lots of other details and information but if you would like to know more do contact Laura who really is an expert and real enthusiast. Our group then fed around six or seven Alpacas – or was it maybe eight? The wine may have affected my ability to count. We penned the animals in, sitting in a large semi-circle (we were sitting not the Alpacas) with various colored feeding bowls on our laps that looked suspiciously liked upturned Frisbees to me but weren't apparently. Anyway, Alpacas eat voraciously and they each wandered between our seated throng chomping and licking each upturned frisbee – sorry bowl, until not a morsel remained. The whole process took just a couple of minutes. They then totally ungratifyingly gueued up at the exit door to be let back out into their field. Truly wonderful, elegant and intelligent creatures with clearly very different personalities. The leaders and followers were clear to see. Then the Alpaca store was visited by some of our contingent, offering all kinds of apparel made from Alpaca wool. I am not making a point here but most of the clientele was from what is oft described as the fairer sex. Hopefully I might get some lovely warm socks for Christmas? I should note, in an effort at gender behavioral balance, that one or two of the men were also seen buying up bottles of the excellent South American wines!
